The Whit Sunday Services this year will be as follows :—

7-0 and 8-0 a.m. and noon, Holy Communion.

10-45, Morning Prayer and Sermon by the Rev. E. H. Horne.

6-30, Evening Prayer and Sermon by the Rev. Canon Rawnsley.

The Sermons will have special reference to the Pan Anglican Congress and the **thank offering** of the Church will be devoted to augment that great gift of thankfulness which will be offered to Almighty God for the extension of His work. We trust that Grasmere Churchpeople will give liberally of their substance on that day. A special hymn for the Congress, written by Canon Rawnsley, will be sung.

The Ante-Communion Service will be read as usual on Whit Monday and Tuesday at 10-0 a.m.

JOTTINGS BY THE WAY.

The Rector and Mrs. Heywood will be away all June, but they leave the parish in the very capable hands of the Rev. E. H. Horne, Rector of Stanford Dingley, near Reading, who will gladly give all the help needful.

The Rev. J. Sinker gave an excellent address on the Pan Anglican Congress on Thursday, 20th May, to a full room, bringing home to many the objects of this great gathering. The sum of £1 18s. 6d. was collected and will be added to the Whit Sunday offerings.

Full particulars of the Sale of Work to be held on July 16th in the Rectory Room will be given in the July number.

The following resolutions were passed at a meeting of the Church Defence Committee held on 26th May, in Ambleside (Rural Deanery):—

“That this Committee believes that neither the Government Bill nor that of the Bishop of St. Asaph afford any basis for a just settlement of the Education question and should be strenuously opposed by Church people.”

“That this Committee cannot agree to any educational settlement which does not provide for the continuance, with full share of public funds, of all schools for which suitable buildings are provided by the Church of England and other religious bodies.”

“That this Committee thinks that in all single school areas parents should be afforded the choice of Denominational or Undenominational teaching for their children.”

At the monthly meeting of the C.E.T.S., held on May 14th, the following resolution was carried unanimously :—

“That this meeting of the members of the Grasmere Branch of the C.E.T.S. express their gratification with the proposals of the Government contained in the Licensing Bill now before Parliament, and view with great hope the passing of such a measure of social reform, which they feel confident will have beneficial results on the improvement in the moral and social wellbeing of the people; and trust that the Government will further strengthen the law relating to the regulation and supervision of clubs.”

The resolution was sent to the Prime Minister and the M.P. of the Division and have been duly acknowledged.

GRASMERE DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION.

It is thought well to draw attention to the following regulations in connection with the services of the District Nurse :—

- I. To attend the sick poor in their homes free, but from those who can afford it a Donation to the Funds is expected.
- II. To attend lodging-house keepers, tradespeople, hotel keepers, farmers, domestic servants, etc., at the rate of 6d. a visit, or daily visit for a week 2/6.
- III. The Nurse may attend other residents or visitors at the rate of 2/6 a visit, or daily visit for a week 10/-; where it does not interfere with her other legitimate work.

It will greatly facilitate matters if people will kindly *pay these charges* to the Treasurer (Miss Simpson, The Wray), as soon as the nurse's visits are ended.

- IV. The Nurse shall attend to all cases brought under her notice by the doctors, and shall also visit those whose names are sent to her by members of the Committee; in cases of emergency she may attend a case *once* at her own discretion, and in *all cases* shall report of what she has done to the patient's doctor before again visiting the sick person.

Any Subscriptions or Donations for 1908, however small, will be gratefully received by the Treasurer *before June 30th*, which is the close of the Financial Year.
