The Lenten Self-Denial Boxes have yielded £4 10s. 0d. this year. This is an improvement. Townend and Easedale districts have been especially kind to the Peshawar Hospital and it is probable that together with the subscriptions the amount for the upkeep of "Grasmere Cot" will have been subscribed for another year. The Annual Sermons will be preached on Sunday, July 18th. The preacher's name will be announced later. Collections at all Services will be made for the General Fund of the Society.

DIOCESAN CONFERENCE.

The Services and Meetings in the Church and Hall were attended by delegates from all over the Diocese on June 16th and 17th. The subject on the first day was "Men, Money, and the Ministry," and a good discussion followed the introductory address. On the second day the Bishop of the Diocese preached at a special Service, and the Meeting which followed was of a devotional nature, reference being made to the Recall to Religion. The arrangements for hospitality were carried out very efficiently by Gen. Sir J. O'Dowda, who represents the parish on the Conference. Our best thanks are due to all those who helped to entertain the delegates.

THE CHOIR.

The members paid a visit to Southport on June 24. An early start was made and a long day was spent by the sea. Many taking a trip in an aeroplane. Mr. J. W. Smith was in charge of the party and the Choirmaster arranged for the catering. The outing was much enjoyed by all, the weather was fine and our only regret is that the boys attending the Grammar School were not allowed to make the trip owing to their compulsory attendance at school.

RUSHBEARING.

The Festival will be held on Saturday, August 7th. The arrangements will be as usual. The children will assemble along the Churchyard Wall at 4-30. The Procession round the village will start at 5-0, and will be followed by the Service. The Bishop of Carlisle has promised to preach. The collection will be divided between the Roof Restoration Fund and the Laymen's Fund for the Augmentation of Poor Benefices. The Festival will be continued on Sunday, Aug. 8th, when the collection will be for the School and the National Society. On Monday, Aug. 9th the bearings will be removed from the Church at 3-0 p.m., and the tea and sports will be held in the School Field.

GARDEN FETE.

The weather was lovely for the Fete organised by Mrs. Nicholls in her garden on June 10th, part of the proceeds being for the purchase of the School Field. There were Stalls of Fancy Work, Pictures, Cake and Provision, Plants, etc., and numerous competitions and side-shows. Tea was served in a marquee which had been specially erected for the occasion. A most enjoyable time was spent by a large number of patrons, and it is hoped that a substantial sum was realised. Our best thanks are offered to Mrs. Nicholls and the Women's Institute for the effort. We understand that the Fund for the purchase of the Field has reached the sum of £100.

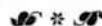
