The following letter has been received from Mr. Ewbank:

Newfoundland Hotel, St. John's, Nfd., 17/4/37.

My dear Rector,

I can't tell you how touched and proud I am at the way in which the ladies of Grasmere have rallied to the help of the poor people of the outports here. I know that Lady Walwyn (wife of the Governor), Mrs. Reg. Harvey and others who have received and distributed the wonderful parcels that have been rolling up have already written officially to tell you with what deep gratitude these gifts have been received. But I feel that this marvellous response to our appeal has been perhaps to some extent due to the kind feelings which our neighbours have towards my wife and me, and their desire to help us in the difficult job we have taken on; and on that account I want to add a word to say what a tremendous help it is to know that so much kindness and support is forthcoming from our own dear and beautiful village. I hope that my wife has been able to tell them personally what we feel. This long winter is slowly drawing to an end. The country is still snow-covered and there are icebergs outside the harbour, but the sun is getting stronger and the spring can't be far off. Better than all is the fact that there are many indications that things are beginning to improve, and if we get a good fishery this year we ought to be on the high road towards economic recovery.
