THE CORONATION.

Special Services will be held on Sunday, May 9th, at the usual times. And on Coronation Day Holy Communion will be at 8, and the Special Service to which all are cordially invited will be held at 10. The collection will be given to King George's Jubilee Trust Fund and the Prince of Wales' British Legion Pension Fund.

THE CONVENTION.

Though the attendance at the Services were moderately good, and the house-to-house visiting in White Bridge on the Sunday evening produced no tangible result, it is felt that our regular worshippers received help and inspiration from the addresses given by the Missioner. A start has been made, and now comes the task of following up the lead that has been given. We are expecting more careful preparation before the reception of the Holy Sacrament, and a more frequent use made of the same high privilege. A meeting of young Communicants will be held during the month with a view to the reviving of the Guild. We hope to hold an open-air Mission Service in the Townend area on some Sunday night after Evensong. Meanwhile the Intercession Services will be held during the summer months on the last Friday in the month at 7-30. We understand that the neighbouring parishes of Langdale and Ambleside will be holding their Missions in November and we hope several of our people will attend these services.

THE CHOIR.

The Misses Salt, who for many years have done splendid work in repairing the Cassocks and Surplices, have had to give

up their task. We are much indebted to them for their willing work for the Church.

Mrs. Adams has kindly taken on the task which is no light one. The men's Cassocks are in need of renewal—they have been in use for nearly 20 years and we should be glad if some of our people would offer to provide new ones, about six are required.

IN MEMORIAM.

The Rev. R. Hartley, M.A., of Kelbarrow and Oxford, passed to his eternal rest at Barnes early in the month. He was a generous supporter of S. Oswald's, and took a keen interest in the children of this parish. For many years he assisted at our Church Services when in residence during the summer, and we shall miss his genial presence very much.

The unexpected death of Mr. A. S. Lee has caused profound sorrow to everyone. The young people have lost a good friend. His genial kindness won for him the affection and regard of everyone who came in touch with him. In his work as an official of the U.D.C. he exhibited an attractive personality which made him very popular. The loss to the Cricket Club is irreparable. His wonderful keenness, sense of humour, and remarkable good nature will be long remembered. He was a devout worshipper in the House of the Lord, and rarely missed a Sunday morning Service. His passing from among us has left a blank, and when the sun goes down on a summer evening we shall remember him.

Miss M. Wilson, who passed away on the evening of Sunday, April 11th, is mourned by many friends. Herself a sufferer she was of a very sympathetic nature, her faithful discharge of daily duties gained the respect of all her contemporaries. She preserved a cheerful mien in spite of continued ill health and exerted a ministry of helpfulness to others. She will be much missed in this place.

Mrs. Watson, Townhead, was well known and respected by all. An enthusiastic member of the M.U., and until recently a regular worshipper in Church. 


