SACRED CONCERT.

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER.

MICHAELMAS.

Michaelmas Day is Monday, 29th Sept. There will be a Celebration of the Holy Communion at 8 a.m. This feast was "specially dear to the heart of S. Francis. It marks our faith in the unseen world. . . Somewhere in that spiritual world there came a fall. 'There was war in heaven.' War in the spiritual sphere and so there came disorder. Our fall is always in our spirit. It is not our bodies that sin, but we who sin with our bodies. The sin is always in the will. There is a right order and a wrong order in things. Soul must control body and mind must control matter. The spirit will only control the body rightly when the spirit is itself controlled rightly. The reason my spirit does not perfectly control my body is that my spirit is not wholly controlled by the Divine Spirit." *Father Andrew.*

RELIGION IN BRITISH INTERNMENT CAMPS.

Religious life in British internment camps is the subject of an article in the August number of *St. Martin's Review* by Mr. E. Muller-Sturmheim, who writes from personal observation as an internee. He found that the free exercise of their religion lightened the burden of internment in many cases. Jewish internees were in an overwhelming majority, and he compares the services of the Orthodox Jews with those of the Liberal Jews.

The services of the Church of England

occupied a very special position and were attended by members of all denominations. "We never felt so clearly the contrast between the world as it is and the world as it ought to be as after a Church of England service," he writes; "but the recurrent exhortation to love our enemies found no echo in our hearts, despite the fact that we fully appreciated the tremendous ethical significance of such a doctrine."—*From The Times.*

NINETY YEARS AGO.

From *The Guardian*, Wednesday, August 6, 1851.

The *Spectator* informs us that the tablet by Thomas Woolner, in memory of Wordsworth, has been placed in Grasmere (*sic*) Church, where the poet lies buried:—"Surmounted by a band of laurel leaves is the inscription, written by Professor Keble, under which the poet's head is sculptured in relief. The likeness to the man has received decisive praise from persons whose verdict is final: the intellectual likeness to the poet will be more widely appreciated, and recognized with as cordial an admiration. The meditative lines of the face, the thoughtful forehead and eye, the compressed sensitive mouth, are rendered with refined intelligence. . . . Throughout the delicately-studied execution shows that the work has been a labour of love."
