

I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with. He has made everything suitable for its time. (Ecclesiastes 3:10 & 11)

This is my last article for the newsletter and magazine for Grasmere and Rydal. My first was in February 2004 and this letter in September 2015 is my 117th submission. The only consistent feature of these articles has been my many grammatical and spelling errors, and I am sure this last effort will not buck the trend.

When I was appointed in 2003 to Grasmere, Rydal and Rydal Hall I was told it was an impossible job by everyone including Bishop Graham. Eleven and half years later Rydal Hall is a flourishing enterprise and our two parishes continue to attract tens of thousands of visitors and are served by small, but faithful congregations. All of this is due to many peoples's hard work of which Alison and I are only one part. When I look at the list of past Rectors in Grasmere Church I see that the first was appointed over 800 years ago. In Rydal the list is shorter but still goes back to 1827. At Rydal Hall there is no list or board and indeed I am the only person so far to have been called Chaplain. In each of these roles some have done the job better than others, only at Rydal Hall can I be regarded as the best as well as the worst incumbent!

The important and relevant fact for Rydal Hall, Rydal and Grasmere is that despite these frequent comings and goings, the faith has remained steadfast in each place. This is due to the church, not the building but the people. Each of those named on the lists in these churches were only one part of the on-going life of the church. As my time comes to an end there will be new beginnings. Often a vacancy is a time for new talents to be discovered and for new people to come into new roles. I am sure the end of my time here will mark the beginning of new ministries among our churches and at Rydal Hall. If we look back to those who have served in the past this will give us renewed hope for the future. Our faith reminds us that God has made everything and all is suitable for its own time. My ministry has now

run its course and it is time to move on but as I go others will come forward and all will continue as it should.

Thank you to all of you on behalf of Alison and myself. We have enjoyed being part of the church and village life. We look forward to seeing you from time to time in the future.

Grasmere Book Group

July and August found us immersed in a contemporary Australian novel with a connection to Grasmere (The Night Guest having been partially written whilst Fiona McFarlane was in the village) and a Welsh classic. Both novels brought some lively discussion. The Night Guest's narrative of later-life care and confidence tricksters made for uneasy reading at times, but most found it a compassionate and page-turning read. Geraint Goodwin's The Heyday in the Blood (1936) was a different experience entirely. Goodwin's depiction of a Welsh border-village encountering modernisation was the backdrop for a love triangle which hooked many readers. A tourist boom and land disputes provided some unlikely humour, whilst the use of Welsh language and dialect was also distinctive (prompting some of the group's own discussions of border experiences). Particular thanks go to Jan Perritt for hosting a lovely August group!

Grasmere Book Group meets next on Thursday 10th September when, in a slight change to our schedule, we'll be discussing Sinclair McKay's The Secret Life of Bletchley Park (2010). For those reading ahead, our October group on Thursday 8th October will be covering Margaret Atwood's most recent collection of short stories, The Stone Mattress (2014). Will and Polly

Will's Triathlon

As some of you may have already seen in the media, Will Clark has decided to take on a new challenge and complete a triathlon spanning the country. He will return to the scene of the accident at Thirlmere to start the first leg of a new triathlon, which will take in a 100 mile cycle, the Great North Run, and a kilometre swim. The first stage, the cycle, will end in Newcastle, where Will was flown to intensive care by the Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS). He will then be joined by 12 friends and family members, who will join him in the Great North Run. The plan is then to head to the Calvert Trust in Keswick to complete a one kilometre swim. The event will raise money for GNAAS, which treated and airlifted Will on the day of his accident, which happened when a stick got caught in the wheel of his bike. Speaking of GNAAS, Will said: "It's only when you really need them that you suddenly realise what a fantastic job they do." The 100 mile cycle will be completed on a battery-powered Boma bike, which is controlled by Will's chin. Chris Swift, of Molten Rock, which provided Will's bike, said: "While we are excited to see our Boma chair take on yet another challenge, it is the man in the driving seat and his strength of spirit that will see the challenge through. We wish Will and his team the very best of luck."

Will is now putting the finishing touches to his training and making the necessary arrangements for the gruelling journey, with the cycle element alone expected to take up to five days. He said: "It's going to be a real challenge, but we are really looking forward to it now.

"Where we are starting is where I left the last triathlon. We will then complete each leg of the journey as I should have done on the day of my accident. I think it will bring some closure." Will wished to thank the Calvert Trust, which provides outdoor education for people with disabilities, for its part in his rehabilitation. "They've made me realise anything is possible," he said.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING THE PROPOSED MERGER OF AMBLESIDE AND HAWKSHEAD MEDICAL PRACTICES

Hawkshead and Ambleside Medical Practices are considering merging to provide medical care for residents and tourists in the Central Lakes area.

WHY ARE WE CONSIDERING THIS?

- Both practices want to ensure that our patients have access to **good** quality local medical care in the long-term.
- A larger patient population will enable us to be in a better position to attract services that will move out of hospitals under the Better Care Together strategy.
- A larger practice will be able to react more positively to the increased workload which all practices are seeing and will continue to see in the future.
- Sharing of resources will provide greater financial security for both practices and will improve equity of medical care across the Central Lakes area.
- We will be in a stronger position to attract more GP trainees who may stay in the area.

WHAT WOULD THIS MEAN FOR OUR PATIENTS?

- More **regular** GPs working together will mean better continuity of care, with fewer locum doctors and more appointments available even during holiday periods.
- All patients would have access to GPs and/or Nurses on three sites- Ambleside, Grasmere and Hawkshead
- We can provide a **wider range of services** to **all** our patients by sharing expertise and manpower.eg. minor surgery, contraceptive services, minor injury services

- Patients will have access to **more appropriate** services e.g. Phlebotomy and Practice Nurse services at a range of sites.
- The practices will continue to develop close working relationships with the pharmacies in each village to ensure patients and visitors are given the best appropriate care.
- Some changes will be required in the services at each site. We have designed these to ensure that we allocate resources to maintain the current service levels.

WANTED

A SELF-EMPLOYED ADMINISTRATOR FOR THE WORDSWORTH SUMMER CONFERENCE AND THE WORDSWORTH WINTER SCHOOL

We are a voluntary charity running the Wordsworth Summer Conference for ten days each August and the Wordsworth Winter School for five days in February. Both events were founded by Richard Wordsworth, great-great-grandson of the poet, and both are now held at Rydal Hall. The Winter School (in 2016 the dates are 22-27 February) is primarily for retired people with an enthusiasm for poetry. The Summer Conference (8-18 August in 2016) is primarily for academics and graduate students.

We are looking for a self-employed person with some administrative experience and computer literacy to provide Pre-Conference Administration for the two events, preferably for a period of several years. The role includes taking bookings, allocating bedrooms, booking excursions and transport, issuing invoices and receipts, and supplying name badges, conference packs, and some printed materials for participants. The actual events are run by the Directors and a graduate student. Busy periods preparing for the Summer event are March-May (for bookings) and a few days in late July or early August (printing materials), and for the Winter School, October-November (for bookings) and a few days in early February (making labels and conference packs).

We expect to pay about £2700 for providing the admin / secretarial work and supplying materials. You will need a computer, broadband access, and a laser printer, and will invoice the Foundation for these services and supplies.

Emergency Plan for Grasmere

There was no formal meeting of the committee in August but the small emergency subcommittee met to continue work on an Emergency Plan for the village. This was in response to a number of concerns expressed by members after a car fire revealed that it was impossible for fire crews to access fire hydrants near the Gingerbread shop.

You should find a draft of the suggested Emergency Plan for Grasmere inserted in this copy of the magazine.

As I explained in July, severe flooding in 2009 led to the formation of a Flood Action Group so some of the suggested actions are already in place such as the provision of emergency supplies of sandbags and grit but there is still much to be done.

We are anxious for all of you to express your views and to influence the plan so it is truly owned by the Grasmere community. Also we want you to have the opportunity to volunteer to help in whatever way you can, whether it is lending or using equipment or making tea for those suffering from an emergency. We hope to arrange a meeting in October for this purpose. Debbie Binch will be present to answer any questions you may have. The date and venue will be announced in the October magazine.

Sale of Lake District National Park properties

I have received another letter about the proposed sale, but it adds little to what was said before. It repeats the hope of finding suitable purchasers who would look after Baneriggs wood and other areas such as Red Bank. We wrote to LDNPA expressing our concerns and asking for a rethink of the planned sell off.

Window Dressing workshops 15th September

These are being held in Ambleside in response to my request for them to be held in a more convenient place than Kendal for small businesses in Grasmere.
