New Life

Dear Friends,

In February and March one of the highlights around us is watching the slow but steady progress of spring bulbs coming into flower. Already snowdrops are showing their white pearl buds, opening to ballerina tutu flowers with grey green leaves setting off their pure beauty. Wild daffodils are showing their needle sharp, fine leaves, spearing upward through the woodland floor into the low sunlight and promise of warmer days.

February 1st is the ancient beginning of Spring, Imbolc in the pre-Christian world, overlaid by the festival of St Bridget, whose flower is a snowdrop. On 2nd February, forty days after Christmas, the church keeps the major festival of Candlemas, recalling the occasion when Mary and Joseph brought their baby for dedication and blessing to the Jerusalem Temple. Simeon recognised the promise in the Christ-child, with a canticle in Luke's gospel that's sung or said at Evensong in the Church of England (and beyond) every day, the Nunc Dimittis. He foresees that this baby will be 'a light to lighten the nations', the Light overlaying the celebration of the first days of Spring and the coming once more of sunlight and warmth to the northern world.

Candlemas ends the festive Christmas season of forty days (an ancient measure of sacred time), and we have only two Sundays before the next forty day period begins, of Lenten austerity preparing for Easter. In rural times, Lent coincided with the ending of conserved food stocks from the previous harvest and the beginning preparations for the new growing season. Lent is indeed a time of preparation, not only for the rural year but in our hearts and lives.

What are we preparing for? We have celebrated the coming of Jesus, the Light of the World and, at Easter, in the mystery of the darkness of night and mist of the new dawn, we rediscover the meaning of resurrection. When Jesus encounters his closest followers on the third day after his crucifixion, it's the beginning of a new hope for the world: that love is stronger than death; that God's creating power overcomes injustice and violence; that reconciliation and peace is possible, for all nations.

May the Lenten season this year bring us the glory of the 'Lent lilies', the wild pseudonarcissus daffodils, celebrated in Grasmere and Rydal worldwide – and bring us hearts full of hope and joy that the Light of the World is among

us still, guiding us, enlightening us, loving us into life united with God and one another. May God be with you this Lent as we journey together to the joy of Easter. Blessings,

The Proposed Mission Community – Open Meeting Note

Brathay Church Hall was full on a dark, wet Monday in mid-January to hear representatives from Binsey talk about their experience of forming a mission community of 11 parishes and 12 churches. Tricia Rogers, leader (Anglican priest), gave a brief history of their gradual movement together:

- They knew the direction they were heading towards
- The key was how to put the grouping together, with different stages over years
- They couldn't 'jump' straight to the goal but needed to get to know each other over quite an extended period and find out whether they could work together
- Decisions were taken by all the churches about who joined up.

Their solution was to always act 'bottom up', resulting in the churches delegating upwards to a single PCC which was the legal body for the whole

group. Each church remained a parish and had its own 'DCC', but all the DCCs gave up some responsibilities, so they weren't duplicating. The focus was meeting people where they are, not getting more people into the pews necessarily but going out into the community. There were creative ideas shared by Hilary and Don, churchwardens, including a library in one church used by the community, training a team of lay pastoral visitors, training a team of lay worship leaders and sharing in each other's events and worship around the group.

There were various questions teasing out practical matters, one of which was the use of Mission Action Planning (MAP) to work out what the different churches were not able to do due to lack of people, resources, etc, but could do if they cut duplication and focused more on looking outward and training lay leaders. There were two Anglican clergy for the group and limited ecumenical church presence, so lay leadership was essential for flourishing.

Giles Wingate-Saul, treasurer and churchwarden of Rusland and a lawyer by background, gave an illustrated presentation on 'What may be needed in law' to set up strong foundations for the proposed mission community in our area. Legally, the mission community will need to be an entity that can act as traditional PCCs in parishes have acted: to employ, insure, enter contracts, manage data protection, safeguarding and other requirements, as well as banking and charity equivalence. We could choose: to become one parish and PCC (with each church having a DCC), as Binsey have; become a limited company (by guarantee); become a trust with trustees; become a partnership of churches by deed; or possibly explore becoming a voluntary association of churches working together, with a Memorandum Of Understanding. This last (MOU) route would mean we could co-ordinate our activities but none would be carried out by the mission community itself as it would not be the legal entity.

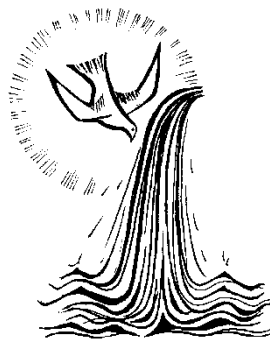

It was an inspiring and encouraging evening – now we need to make and take time to get to know each other by talking, sharing and honestly working from the grass roots to discern God's way forward for our parishes, churches and communities.

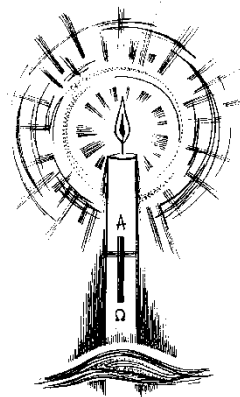

Just before Christmas we received first-hand information on the shoe box distribution; Judith Myers from Hawkshead went out with Teams4U to help with the delivery and she sent an email to Ann Dixon. The boxes were sent to Belarus, Croatia, Romania and the Ukraine where the conditions were found to be even worse than in Romania. Not only were distributions difficult because of the distances involved, but also because of the time taken to cross the border into a war zone. Judith described the conditions for one family

who were living in a wooden shed with no electricity or running water. The father was tending a farmer's sheep in return for their accommodation but no wages. She thanked everyone for their contributions: 'a shoebox may seem a small insignificant thing to give, but the excitement and joy it brings to one of these children is a joy to see'.

At our first meeting of the year several of us were busy with items for this year's shoeboxes, but only after we had indulged in a delicious chocolate cake provided by Carrie to celebrate the third birthday of Knit and Nat.

In February we will meet on Friday 9th and Tuesday 27th and March dates will be the same: Friday 9th and Tuesday 27th. The dates are on the noticeboard outside Barneys. The Reading Room is open by 2pm and we stay until 4pm. As usual, we welcome anyone, any age, to join us for the afternoon, or any part of it.

We have now been open over 16 years, and the pharmacy is busier than ever. This includes rising prescription numbers, increased flu vaccinations, and greater uptake of a variety of other services.

Our current NHS contract finishes on 31st March 2018. To date, we have not received any news of an extension to this contract, from NHS England (Lancashire and South Cumbria), our Area Team. However, we remain hopeful.

Thank-you to everyone who made comments on Cumbria County Council's Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment Consultation, highlighting our uncertain future.

The NHS values patients' views on the services they receive. One way is to place a review on the NHS Choices website. There is a section to comment on various services, including local pharmacies. This was very helpful when we were last under threat, but unfortunately the previous reviews have expired!

We should know our future by the time this Parish Magazine is published. Please check with the pharmacy whether it's time to e-mail the NHS Area Team, or our MP, Tim Farron. *Trevor Eastes*

Events at the Wordsworth Trust

After a quiet January, spent cleaning and refreshing Dove Cottage for the year ahead, we are really looking forward to getting back to normal in February and March. As ever, we have a great range of events going on and hope that you'll come along to some.

Discover Poetry with Polly Atkin starts the new season at 7.30pm on Thursday 1st February with a shared reading and discussion of some seasonal poems. We'll be moving on from winter towards spring, ready for the final session on Thursday 1st March.

Grasmere History Group meetings resume on Tuesday 6th February with an illustrated talk about Moses Bowness, a Victorian photographer from Ambleside, and the opportunity to hear about plans for a sensory garden in Town End as part of the Reimagining Wordsworth project. We will also decide the topic for our March meeting.

The next instalments of Pamela Woof's literature classes on *The Prelude 1805* take place on Wednesdays 14th February and March. The group are now midway through the poem, sometimes described as one of the first autobiographies in the English language. No prior knowledge or reading is necessary and the classes are open to all.

There are three Saturday afternoon talks to enjoy in the next few weeks. At **Remarkable Lives** on Saturday 17th February we will hear about three important but often overlooked members of the Wordsworth circle from three speakers: Mary Wordsworth by Kay Adkins, Edward de Quillinan with Marion Watts and Hartley Coleridge from Joanna Taylor. Nicholas Roe is giving the Jonathan Wordsworth Memorial Lecture this year, titled **Wordsworth and Coleridge: The Radical Years Revisited**, at 11.00am on Saturday 24th February. On Saturday 24th March we are delighted to welcome Philippa Turnbull of the Crewel Work Company to talk about a new exhibition of 19th-century needlework titled **Dorothy Wordsworth, a Stitch in her Time**. This exhibition also features pieces newly-created in response to items from our collection and will be on display until the end of April.

Finally, February features the second instalment of the very popular Dove Cottage Tuesday series of talks. On Tuesday 6th we will hear from Melissa Mitchell about **Women's Lives through Letters** and Marian Veevers on **The Lives of Jane Austen and Dorothy Wordsworth**. Hazel Clarke will tell us

more about the stories lining the walls of the newspaper room in **Wordsworth's Times** on the morning of Tuesday 20th, followed by **The Romantics in Parody: 'an everyday story of towering genius'** by Catherine Kay in the afternoon. On Tuesday 27th Jaclyn Bradley will explain her work in digitising a collection of letters by engraver Thomas Bewick in **Bewick through a Camera Lens** at 11.00am and Tom Langridge will discuss **Wordsworth for the 21st Century** at 2.00pm. There will be tea, toast, a roaring fire and lively conversation on all three days, do join us if that sounds appealing.

Another busy year!

After a busy 2017 we can look forward to what promises to be an even busier 2018. The success of the installation of adult outdoor activity equipment in Broadgate Meadow is merely the beginning of a wholesale upgrading of the activity areas. Improved drainage and surfaces for the different areas, including the existing area for younger children, are already planned.

So far only half of the £20,000 grant by SLDC for this Locally Important Project has been spent. Another £10,000 has been donated by a generous local philanthropist, £3000 by the GVS, £2,000 from your chairman's locality money, £265 from the Wordsworth Hotel. Nick McCraith has also applied to the Cumbria Foundation for £4,000 and the cooperative has been asked to make this one of their Local projects.

We hope that all those who use the Co-op will vote for this project, which really will make a great difference for all ages in our community.

Any donation which you would be able to give, however small, would help us with this project. It is bound to take time and effort to do all we would wish, but a great beginning has been made. Our treasurer, Marguerite Jenkinson, is in charge of safeguarding the fund and would be delighted with any contribution you could make.

The Lakeshore

The margins of the lake have been getting steadily more covered with litter. The area under the wall beside the A591 is particularly unsightly and a poor introduction to our lovely village. The footpaths on the other side of the lake also need attention. Paul and Anne Truelove have been doing sterling work trying to cope with this, but need help.

We have been attempting to involve the landowners, who have a legal responsibility, but it has not been easy to track them all down and ensure they take appropriate action. We are therefore considering having a work party and would very much appreciate volunteers with the strength needed for what is a more demanding job than our usual litter picks. Please do get in touch with Paul Truelove, Tony Lawrence or Nick McCraith if you would be prepared to help us with this essential task.

Red Squirrels

GVS has given a further £500 to help with the re-establishment of this wonderful animal in our valley. It is a real delight to see how well they have been doing in recent years. Concern for their welfare in Thirlmere was one of the reasons mentioned by Paul Truelove in the letter of objection to the proposed Thirlmere zipwire he wrote on behalf of GVS. The committee were also concerned with the safety of those using the A591 as well as those travelling on the zipwire across the lake and the road. It is interesting to note that the Highways Agency is also opposing the project on safety grounds.

The effect on the iconic scenery in what is still one of the less built up areas of the Lake District, at a time when it has recently been granted World Heritage site status, was another point in Paul's detailed and well-argued letter.
