Knit and Nat

Unfortunately I have nothing of interest to report on the mystery of the notice board, however, on a positive note no more notices have been removed. As an Archers fan, I am thinking that this scenario is rather like their mystery: the bunting that went missing in 2015 and now keeps

reappearing in small amounts; village life is much the same whether it is Grasmere or Ambridge.

Our meetings for the next two months are: in June the second Friday 14th and the fourth Tuesday 25th, and in July Friday 12th and Tuesday 23rd. We gather at around 2pm and are there until 4pm. We have cups of tea or coffee and biscuits available, do bring your knitting, crocheting or any other craft you are busy with or just come for a friendly welcome and a chat.

The Knit and Natters have been discussing the possibility of a new project to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the birth of William Wordsworth. Some of the group are knitting prototype daffodils to find one that will withstand being outdoors for some months.

Carrie wrote about our new project when we had a fund raising table at the Village Hall in May: 'We have the vision of 250 daffodils adorning the branches of one of the trees in the middle of the village. All this needs funds for licences and equipment, hence this table.'

In some areas of the country knitters cover structures in public places with their knitting and this is often called Yarn bombing. In Threlkeld each year at both Easter and Christmas time knitted items are displayed on the church gate. The knitters of Threlkeld knit daffodils for Easter and choir boys for Christmas. We are hoping to be able to 'yarn bomb' one of the trees in Moss Parrock.

Grasmere Reading Rooms

The Reading Rooms have enjoyed another successful year with two snooker teams competing in the Milnthorpe and district Snooker league. This year, and for the second time, Peter Foster brought home the champion of champions trophy after attending the knockout competition in Kendal, with the best players from other league teams. If you enjoy snooker or pool, the club is open during bar hours from 8pm to 11pm, Thursday-Sunday. Members can use the tables outside of bar hours as well.

League snooker starts again in autumn, and any new players are welcome to come and join us before then to practice.

Reading Rooms memberships are renewed on 14th June each year. As a charity, membership fees help pay towards the upkeep of the premises. Membership subscriptions are still only £10 for the year. St. Oswald's shortlisted for Conservation award

St Oswald's Church has been shortlisted for the John Betjeman Award for excellence in building conservation. The tower restoration project was among only four churches shortlisted from 23 entries.

The John Betjeman award is given for repairs that demonstrate an excellence in the conservation of historic fabric and the promotion of traditional and/or innovative repair techniques.

The award, established in 1990 and named in honour of writer and conservation campaigner Sir John Betjeman, celebrates excellence in the repair of places of worship of all faiths in England and Wales, and is run by the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB). SPAB was founded by William Morris in 1877 and has had many famous supporters including Beatrix Potter and John Betjeman.

The ancient church of St Oswald's had historically been stripped of its old traditional lime render in the 1890's and the old stones re-pointed in a heavy ribbon-style pointing. Just thirty years later, the consequences of this treatment were becoming apparent, leaving the church damp, wet and cold, and further work was necessary. This time, action came in the form of a cement-based pebble-dash render encasing the church, completed in 1921, which received a damning review by Beatrix Potter in a letter to the SPAB in 1926.

The recent phase of works to repair the tower has been to 'un-do' the damage caused when the original lime render was first removed in the 1890's. The cement render was holding water within the stonework, and the cracks and falling debris from high level had become dangerous. The cement was replaced with a traditional lime mortar to the joints and to the rendered faces, protecting the walls in a way that allows the walls to breathe and dry out, rather like a Gore-tex jacket. Other repairs were also carried out to the roof, fixing of cracks in the walls and repair of the clock.

The award is always made to the building rather than to an individual, so this is a chance for the whole community to celebrate the quality of work completed in its building. The winner will be announced at the SPAB Members' meeting on 13th July.



Continued care and repair...

Lime mortars and renders can take months to carbonate (set), but once carbonated they are excellent at managing moisture within solid walls and keeping them dry!

High-level limewash and top 5mm of harling requires re-applying to pinnacles and some areas at the tops of walls



***You may notice** that some of the high-level limewash paint is flaking and in some localised areas, the outer skin of harling has crumbled - this has been caused by continued saturation of the fresh new mortar in this **very wet** part of the country! Lime mortars require months, sometimes years to carbonate (set), and need dry weather in the first few months to build up resilience before the first frosts come - dry weather is something that is rare in the Lake District, so here we see that continued saturation of the walls at the top of the tower has left it vulnerable to frost that has burst-through the surface as the water particles expand.*

Rectifying the damaged mortar and limewash is part of the on-going project.

Grasmere Book Group

In April, we discussed Amor Towles' *A Gentleman in Moscow* (2016). The novel garnered some warm reviews from the group. All found something to like in the meandering historical tale of Count Rostov, sentenced to house arrest in Moscow's Metropol Hotel, and passing the years creatively and subversively. There were some questions about how radical the novel really was and recalling the significance of characters in a long book, but mainly it prompted much talk about hotels and hotel life!

In May, we read the reigning Booker-winning novel, Anna Burns' *Milkman* (2018). Following Burns' win, the novel was frequently described as a difficult read because of the narrative style, but many found once they were in the flow of the protagonist's voice, it was both captivating and characterful. The denseness of the text on the page was more difficult than the voice itself for many. The subject matter itself was challenging in a different way, and for some readers its depictions of violence and sexual aggression during the Troubles proved too hard to read. Others identified with the book in unexpected ways, and found relatable humour in the narrator's story. We ended discussing why we hadn't read more novels from Northern Ireland.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday June 13th** at 8pm to discuss Miriam Darlington's study of owls, human life and nature, *Owl Sense* (2018). Then on **July 11th**, we tackle the mysterious fantasy world of Philip Pullman's *La Belle Sauvage* (2017), volume one of the sequel to Pullman's *His Dark Materials* trilogy. The venue will be the Library at the Wordsworth Trust's Jerwood Centre. Both books are available at Sam Read's in Grasmere at the usual 10% discount for book group titles.

Two free literary events to mention, both in collaboration with Sam Read Bookseller and taking place at Emma's Dell - 7.30pm (doors 7pm):

Tuesday June 18th – Shap-based writer Katie Hale reads from her debut novel *My Name Is Monster*.

Tuesday July 9th – Kim Sherwood reads from her debut novel *Testament*, which touches on the history of the Windermere Boys, child survivors of the Holocaust who stayed on the Calgarth Estate.

Looking forward to catching up with members old and new in the coming events. All are welcome!

Events at the Wordsworth Trust

This summer we are out and about more than ever, with a whole host of fantastic events both in Grasmere and all around Cumbria...

‘What is Natural?’ is an all-day special event taking place on 22nd June that holds the natural world at its heart: how we inhabit it, how we are inspired by it, how we have failed it - and how we can sustain it. Walk with Wordsworth’s birds in the morning, and with William and Dorothy at night; learn about environmental projects in Cumbria and beyond; discover how nature has inspired and continues to inspire us to incredible creative works; and explore the ways that we can act in time to care for the world that we live in, and are a part of. The day includes talks from Harriet and Rob Fraser, Harvey Wilkinson of the National Trust, Ian Brodie of Friends of the Lake District, and Tim Morton of Rice University, as well as well as early morning and late night walks exploring the extraordinary stories that the landscape of Grasmere has to tell. A full schedule and booking information can be found on our website.

Why Should We Read...? is a series of talks introducing you to the Romantic writers through the very best bits of their work, read aloud from original 200-year old books. On 15th July Professor Sharon Ruston will be showcasing the work of **Percy Bysshe Shelley**, and on 20th July Professor Stephen Gill will explore the work of **William Wordsworth** himself.

As part of the nationwide **Places of Poetry** project we are running a week of free events from 29th July to 4th August exploring the literary and natural heritage of the Lake District through poetry, including free guided walks, poetry cafés, and activities with Daljit Nagra, our guest poet for the event.

In June and July **Reimagining Wordsworth On Tour** continues to make its way across Cumbria. These free pop-up events introduce William Wordsworth, his sister Dorothy, and their life at Dove Cottage, as well as incredible items from our collection. You can find a full list of tour stops on our website.

We are leading guided walks with the Lake District National Park at some of Wordsworth’s favourite places in the Lake District. On 1st June and 13th July we will be visiting Ullswater and Aira Force with **In the Footsteps of Wordsworth** and on 31st July we will be exploring **Wordsworth’s Hawkshead** with two walks around the town and surrounding countryside.

Our family fun activities will be found in local libraries, at Brockhole, and at Theatre by the Lake. The themes for June and July are **High Hills and Mighty Mountains** and **Summer Garden**: you can find more information about the timings, content and location of each session on our website.

Our regular gatherings will continue to meet as usual. **Grasmere History Group** meets on 4th June and 2nd July in the Jerwood Centre. **Dove Cottage Poets** meets on 6th June and 4th July in the Lower Rotunda. **Discover Poetry** with Polly Atkin meets on 27th June at Rydal Mount and on 18th July in Dove Cottage; for the session at Rydal Mount you are also invited to take the unique opportunity to enjoy a cream tea in Wordsworth's dining room and to explore the house after hours.
