

We have just received the results of our church school inspection (SIAMS). Here is the summary:

Leaders have a deep and considered understanding of the Christian vision and associated values which guides all decisions and actions. Consequently, the words of 'life in all its fullness' are a lived reality.

Ambitious leaders are passionate about the curriculum ensuring it is engaging through its breadth and depth. It is well-planned, well-sequenced and creative. Spontaneous and planned opportunities for spiritual development enhance pupils' spirituality.

A culture of love permeates throughout the school which is modelled effectively by staff. A deep rooted sense of acceptance is lived out through caring relationships. Consequently, pupils and adults are known, loved and valued as the unique person they are.

Collective worship is an invitational and inspirational time to gather as one. It provides meaningful moments for stillness and reflection, together with joyful singing which is enhanced through the use of sign language. Therefore, it provides a special time for the spiritual flourishing of pupils and adults. Pupils have a high sense of personal responsibility for the world they live in. They seek to actively challenge injustice through opportunities to be agents of change.

A SIAMS inspection is very much about ethos, and we found ourselves talking about what we believe, and why we do what we do. It's a useful exercise, explaining ourselves to those outside our school, and reflecting on what they say in response. 'A culture of love' – that's what we're trying to create, in every little interaction. I'm so glad that's what the inspector saw.

Grasmere Rushbearing 2024

Back in the early years of St Oswald's church, the earth floor was covered in rushes. Every summer it would be swept out, and new rushes laid down. From that, to this...

'Our Rushbearing features maypoles and rush maidens, banners and bearings, gingerbread, and a fell race. This year Reverend Lawrence Basham led the



service, and we were delighted to welcome him as our future Rector. The church was full of happy laughter, and that feeling of a community coming together. 'It is a unique thing, Grasmere Rushbearing, made of lots of contrasts - the stillness and quiet of the two days making bearings, the physicality of cutting rushes by the lake (Thanks to Jonny Perrem), the preparation of the (Ulverston) band and their outfits, and (Grasmere) gingerbread baking and marshals. And then the gentle procession, wending its way through tourists and baffled stationary traffic, singing, and chatting. It is such a very old thing, and yet it felt absolutely right to still be doing it to-day'.

Plenty more events are planned for later in the year, including "The Plot Thickens", a mystery play on 21th November and "Polaris", a children's show on 13th December. Fool's Gold will be bringing us a Christmas show on 14th December, and a New Year's Eve party is planned. If anyone is willing and able to help – in any way – on New Year's Eve, please let the Trustees know.

The Christmas Fair will be back in the Hall this year on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th December, featuring Father Christmas in his Grotto and the Grand Christmas Raffle draw – so don't miss it! Stalls are booking up quickly but there is still some space. If you would like to take (or share) a table, please get in touch. We have been raising funds throughout this year for our new **audio-visual system** which will replace the portable projector and white sheet currently in use. We aim to provide a state-of-the-art system which will be available for use by community groups and individual hirers, facilitating high-quality presentations for talks, courses, conferences and parties. We plan to arrange cinema nights, quizzes, etc. We might even come together as a community to watch the match the next time England get to a final!

We are delighted that we have been successful in two recent applications for grant funding from Westmorland & Furness Council (£5000) and from the Fibrus Community Fund, Cumbria (£2000), and we are awaiting decisions from two further applications. Watch this space for further news of our fundraising progress – we hope to share more good news in the next newsletter. Thank you to everyone who generously donated to our last Christmas raffle, supported our recent events, or made individual donations – they are hugely appreciated!

As a charity, the Trustees are tasked with running and maintaining the Village Hall for the benefit of the inhabitants of Grasmere, and providing facilities for recreation and leisure time use, whilst ensuring the health and safety of all users. To this end, we are obliged to raise funds through a range of means, including donations, hiring out the hall, fundraising events, grants, and through hiring out parking spaces on yearly permits. Over the past year, the Trustees have been reviewing the income generated from the car park and, following much debate and consideration, we have made the decision to instigate charging for the car park via an Automatic Number Plate Recognition system and the RingGo app. Current car park permit holders will be able to continue using the car park until September, but after this time, parking with be chargeable at the same rates as the Broadgate Meadow car park. The good news for local residents is that the first 30 minutes' parking will be free of charge, so you will be able to leave your car at the hall while you pop to the chemist or the Co-op without being charged. This much-needed income will allow us to carry out further work: vital fire and health & safety improvements, new front doors with an electronic entry system, roof and gutter repairs, redecoration of the hall interior - to name but a few! wordsworth GRASMERE



We are currently open 7 days a week, 10am-5pm. From September we will be open Tuesday-Saturday, 10am-4pm. Entry to Dove Cottage, the Museum and exhibitions is free to Grasmere residents and employees of Grasmere businesses.

In Wordsworth's time, Claude Mirrors were used widely to contemplate and draw landscape. Available in different shapes and sizes, mirrors were carried by artists, poets and tourists in their discovery of the Lakes. Canadian artists Alex McKay and Dr Suzanne Matheson have collaborated on a project to design and install a contemporary Claude mirror at Wordsworth Grasmere (https://wordsworth.org.uk/webcam/) alongside a set of handheld Claude mirrors to use in artistic workshops.

If you visit us in early August you will be able to enjoy flash talks and workshops exploring the history and use of Claude mirrors; visit our website for dates and times as these will repeat on different days. Alex and Suzanne will also be leading longer creative sessions with Grasmere WI and visiting conference delegates.

On Monday 5 August children aged 6+ can learn to **Paint Like a Georgian Artist** with Alex and Suzanne and spend time in the Sensory Garden creating a watercolour painting using a Claude mirror. These family workshops are free and take place at 10.30am and 2.00pm.



On 15 and 28 August drop in from 10.30am-12.30pm for free family **Summer Make and Play** sessions. Join us to create a range of summer crafts and take part in trails and play activities.

Little Wanderers. Our creative play sessions for under 5s takes place every Friday morning in the Woodland. After a break in August the next session will be on Friday 6 September. Free for Grasmere families.

On Tuesday 10 September join us at St Oswald's Church for **An Evening** with Simon Armitage. There will be a pop-up bar and bookstall, as well as a book signing after the poetry reading.

The next event in **'Go to the poets, they will speak to thee'**, our online poetry reading series hosted by Kim Moore, takes place on Wednesday 18 September with Katrina Naomi.

Grasmere and Cumbria Weather -

MAY

May brought an unusual combination of warmth and rain to finish off what has been a mild and very wet Spring. The month started sunny and warm at first, but became cooler and more unsettled on the 4th., as low pressure edged up from the south. Pressure built strongly on the 7th., as warm air was drawn west from the near continent, with temps. peaking on the 11th. widely exceeding 72.F. Cumbria's warmest was Scotby, east Carlisle, with a high of 80.F.

On the morning of the 10th., here in Grasmere and north Cumbria, there was the best display of the Aurora Borealis for 20 years. Judging by the photos, it was a sight to behold. On the 13th., temps. dropped, as a cold front moved east with heavy rain. The next week was also unsettled with rain at times. High pressure again arrived on the 19th. to the 21st. Then on the 22nd. a very slow moving depression deepened rapidly, bringing an exceptionally wet day across Cumbria, with every weather station recording the 22nd. as its wettest day of the month.

Indeed, the Met. Office have stated that provisionally the 22nd. was the wettest Spring day on record for northern England and some stations experienced record breaking amounts of rainfall. This saw a large number of sites record more than a months worth of rain in one day. Whilst the Met. Office are currently quoting Honister as having the greatest 124.0 mm. (4.88 in.) 24 hr. fall in the U.K., the honour goes to Braithwaite Force Crag Mine with 150.9 mm. (5.91 in.) But when this total is matched with Honister's monthly total of 242.1 mm. (9.53 in.), the highest total in Cumbria for May, the event on the 22nd. begins to show its significance.

As the low pressure system moved slowly north, there were reports of extensive flooding in Carlisle and in the Eden Valley, households were cut off by rapidly rising rivers. This unsettled theme continued until the months end, but fortunately no problems arose here in Grasmere. At Coniston, 11mm. (0.43 in.) fell in 14 minutes on the 19th. Mean temperatures in May were well above average, despite the cloud and rain, with night temperatures some 3.5.C. above normal. Strangely, at Maulds Meaburn near Penrith, the lowest temperature of the month was recorded as 4.0.C., and is the highest yet recorded for May as the nights were frost free.

The dominant wind direction was east north east. Sunshine data- Bewcastle 164.3 hours. Brampton 140.1. Ambleside 130.3

Here in Grasmere. Wettest May Day 22nd. 79.9mm. (3.15 in.) May rain days 14. Last year 11. Total for month 172.4mm. (6.79 in) Last year 1.71 in. Av. 4.74 in. Rain days to date (end of May) 107. Last year 103. Total for year to date (end May) 1351.3 mm. 53.19in. Last year 46.68in.

JUNE

The meteorological Spring (March, April and May) was the warmest in 140 years. The average temperature was 48.9.F. (9.37.C.) beating the previous high of 9.12.C. in 2017. The UK also had the wettest Spring since 1986, the 6th. wettest on record. An average of 12 inches fell across the country, a third more than usual. June got off to a very chilly start.

Figures show that in every month this year, temperature records have been set, but this first month of our current summer has rarely touched the seasonal averages. This was due to the fact that the UK. was caught between low pressure off to the east over Scandinavia and high pressure stuck over the south west. This meant that a cold north westerly straight from the Arctic, dominated our weather for the first fortnight. Temperatures were 2.C. below average here. Unlike May, it was the coldest start to June for 5 years, and also the first summer without a hosepipe ban for 3 years.

The unsettled start brought heavy showers at times, some brief sunny spells, cold north easterlies and cumulonimbus clouds on the 10th. with heavy hail showers. However, with pressure rising and the jet stream moving north, brought welcome warmth from the 19th. Sunny days followed with hot sunshine.

The balmy weather that followed was short lived and low pressure returned before the month's end with cloud, showers and longer periods of rain. But it was a drier than average June and we surprisingly enjoyed more sunshine than usual. But here in Grasmere, we have experienced only 24 completely dry days in 6 months. Some stunning photographs of noctilucent clouds were taken here in Cumbria on the evening of June 1st. These are the highest clouds above the stratosphere, 53 miles high. They appear as milky waves of colour, high in the sky on midsummer nights. Their name derives from the Latin for " night shining ".

The Met. Office measures sunshine using either the Campbell - Stokes recorder invented in the 19th. century, or modern sunshine sensors. The C.S. recorder, which is being phased out, was a glass sphere to focus the sun's direct radiation on a graduated card. The Met Office says the method can significantly overestimate sunshine duration on cloudy days. CS recorders are still in use at many of the 140 manual climate stations it operates. Here's hoping we haven't seen the last of summer.

Wettest June day 13th.35.1 mm. (1.38 in.) June rain days 20 Last year 13

Some people enjoy sheepdog trialling, but we have never become involved in this and that also goes for the wrestling. Cumberland wrestling is a really big part of the shows across the county but somehow after a long day working the beer tent is more of an attraction!


The group is down to 2 active responders with another going through the application process. The committee / trustees are also very low on numbers and currently without a secretary, or anyone to organise us!

June's meeting tackled a book which seems to have been everywhere over the past year, RF Kuang's *Yellowface* (2023). Just before the group met it was awarded Fiction Book of the Year at the British Book Awards. The novel throws into relief some of the more troubling aspects of the publishing world. When June's much more successful writer friend Athena dies suddenly June appropriates Athena's next novel and with it her ethnicity, reinventing herself as ethnically ambiguous Juniper. Most enjoyed the book although found the narrator hard to spend time with. The book raised some interesting questions about plagiarism, identity and writing and just how realistic the events of *Yellowface* were.

July's meeting was a hybrid event, kindly hosted at Lake View by Ros and Richard Abbott. The month's reading was Robin Jenkins' *The Cone-Gatherers* (1955), a Scottish novel set on a highland estate during the Second World War. Part parable, part psychological thriller, it explores questions of ownership of place, power over others and notions of good and evil. The group had lots to say about the book and although few would say it was enjoyable, most were engaged and drawn into the story. Many commented on the poetic writing of landscape in the novel.

Olympics 1924

We are in the middle of the 2024 Paris Olympics (26 July - 11 August). It was 100 years ago this summer, also at the Paris Olympics, that a young science student at Edinburgh University, Eric Liddell, ran an astonishing race that caught the imagination of millions worldwide.

Liddell had been born in China in 1902, to Scottish missionaries there. Early on, he had made a deep commitment to Jesus Christ, and sensed he was being called to spend his life in serving others. But Liddell was also an outstanding sportsman, playing rugby for Scotland before settling on athletics.

When he was chosen for the Paris Olympics, he expected to run his preferred 100m. But then came the news that the race would be run on a Sunday, and Liddell refused. Quickly, he trained for the 200m and 400m. He took bronze at the 200m, but no one expected much from him at the 400m. Instead, he won, and even broke the world record in the process.

After the Olympics, Liddell felt God calling him to his life's work. He went back to China, to teach in a Christian college. As the Second World War loomed, he sent his wife and children home, but stayed on himself. By 1943 Liddell was confined to a brutal prison camp, where he shone among the fellow prisoners – encouraging them, teaching Bible classes, and praying for both his fellow inmates and the prison wardens. Deeply malnourished, his health failed and in 1945, just months before the war ended, he died, aged only 43.

In 1981 his story was made into the Oscar-winning film Chariots of Fire.
