

### From St Oswald's

You may be aware that the Rector of St Oswald's has moved to a new parish - Rev David Wilmot is now the Vicar of St Paul's Grange and we wish him well in his new role.

In the intervening months the Rural Deacon will oversee St Oswald's with the churchwardens taking day to day responsibility for the church.



The process to secure a new minister involves producing a profile of the benefice detailing what happens in each church, where the incumbent will live and most importantly what qualities the PCC would like the new Rector to have to help the church grow and become an integral part of village and school life.

This first stage has been completed and the advertisement for the new post has been placed in the *Church Times*, and on the Church of England and the Diocesan website. The interviews will take place in midJune, and it is hoped that the new Rector will be in place by autumn. We are confident that by then the new vicarage will have been completed, ready for the Rector to move into. Willow Bank Rectory has undergone a major refurbishment making it as eco-friendly as possible and the perfect base for a new family to make a home.

We are excited to be appointing a new Rector for our village and hope they will receive a warm welcome when they arrive later this year.





### Grasmere and Cumbria Weather - MARCH

Yet another mild, wet month with frequent rain and limited sunshine. The unsettled weather carried on from February into the beginning of the month. A brilliant red sky on the 1st. gave way to showers, with snow on the tops above 800 ft. An air frost on



the morning of the 2nd. was followed by brief sunshine and occasional showers. But clearer weather on the night of the 3rd., enabled a brilliant display of the Aurora Borealis to be seen from Grasmere. Another frost followed on the 4th. with the sun actually putting in an appearance. The second week was drier with brief sunshine and isolated showers brought on a cool easterly. But it soon turned unsettled again with showers and longer spells of rain. This of course due to the jet stream being further south than usual. On a positive note we had the first completely dry day on March 6th. since January 17th. Around Cumbria, farmers in Bewcastle near Brampton, were fed up with continual standing water in the fields. They had 26 days of saturated soils in February and 24 days in March. That's 50 days out of the last 60 when fields were ponding. In Maulds Meaburn, near Penrith, a record low of barometric pressure was recorded of 971.3 mb. on the 28th. It was the lowest ever for March and for the first time pressure did not attain 1030 mb. on at least one day during the month. The Met Office said that March was the 10th. month in a row to be the warmest on record for the time of year, and that it was the wettest March overall for 40 years. Many Met. stations recorded over 140% of the average. Only Seaton near Workington, would finish slightly drier than average at 93%. The county as a whole, trending around the 125% mark. The dominant wind direction for the month was East North Easterly. Monthly sunshine hours. Bewcastle 89.7 hours, Brampton 86.5 hours, Shap 74.3 hours and Ambleside 54.1 hours.

#### **APRIL**

It was the second wettest April in Grasmere since 1890. Only 1947 was wetter with 12.71 inches being recorded.



April set off on a chilly note, with strong north easterly winds bringing cloudy conditions and heavy showers. Overcast days followed with rain heavy at times, culminating in over 4 inches the first week. Mentioning Bewcastle last month, the 2nd. week here was horrendous too, with yet more heavy rain brought on an active southwesterly. The field in front of Tanner Croft, here in the centre of the village, was yet again flooded with girt dubs o' watter. The soggy conditions attracted six herons over the next few days, foraging in the moisture laden ground. Showers and brief sun followed. Then around the 19th. pressure rose. This anticyclone was only the second one to become established this year since January 12th. This also enabled many people in Cumbria to witness the Northern Lights again for the second time, on the night of the 19th. This was followed by an air frost on the morning of the 20th. Welcome sunny conditions followed, and sitting outside was a pleasure for the first time. The anticyclone was dominant for several days, although a cool north easterly kept the temperature down. We also witnessed the first fine day of the month on the 23rd. the first since March 8th. This brings a grand total of 7 completely dry days in 4 months.

Shap recorded - 6. C. on the morning of the 26th. Here, with the wind chill factor, it felt like 37. F. in the daytime. On a personal note, I would like to express my thanks to Melissa Harwood, who organised a planned visit to my garden, through the charitable Cumbria Gardens Trust. The garden having been flooded on several occasions, I can say with great relief, by chance, to have picked a beautiful, sunny day. So all in all, it has been to date the wettest 18 months in England's recorded history. In terms of sunshine it's been disappointing with around 42% of average, whilst it normally would be around 59%. At least May started on a better note.

### **Grasmere Village Society**

Flaming June is the usual expression but May has done its best to dazzle us. Colourful displays of rhododendrons, azaleas, cherry and hawthorn to name but a few, and of course the wonderful bluebells. In the sky we have been treated to displays of the Northern Lights and occasionally a large yellow orb has appeared. Needless to say rain has not been far away, but speaking of matters aquatic take a moment to reflect that on June 6<sup>th</sup> it is the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day when in 1944 the Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy as part of the largest seaborne invasion in history.

We take our freedom for granted but the war memorial in Broadgate Meadow is a sober reminder that even small communities like Grasmere paid a terrible price.

The GVS has now installed the Vivienne Rees memorial bench on Broadgate Meadow and has replaced the two picnic table and bench sets near the park entrance. Our thanks to the council for the actual installations.

We have also finally achieved some tree planting on Moss Parrock with two cherry blossom trees. Thanks to Simon Hey for all his hard work in bringing this to fruition and also to Ella Footit who has sponsored both trees in memory of her late husband, Gordon.

Many of you will have noticed that the bus shelter opposite the Daffodil hotel is presently out of commission. Graham Magennis noted problems when he was replacing some roof slates and a structural survey has confirmed this. We are at present awaiting estimates for the repairs required, whilst also considering a complete rebuild in stone, similar to the other shelters in the village. Any thoughts on this would be gratefully received.

The GVS, together with SCRT (South Cumbria Rivers Trust), are trying to control the 3 invasive species in our area: Skunk Cabbage, Japanese Knotweed and Himalayan Balsam. The Balsam is the one that we can control by pulling but the other two need either chemical treatment or digging very deep!

In Grasmere, at the beginning of the waterways leading on to Rydal, Windermere and onwards, we have formed a very small group who, over the past five years, are trying to lessen if not eradicate the Balsam altogether in and around the village.

The plant itself is quite easy to pull as its roots are very shallow. We then take the roots off the stem and stamp on them. The flower with its seeds is bagged and burnt.

If there is anyone who fancies assisting us please contact me or Sharon Savasi, our lead on invasive species- the more the merrier! We start at the end of June through to when the seeds explode in September, just half a day, once or twice a week. Thank you.

Mid-July to early September: The Lake Artists Society will be in the Hall with their annual summer exhibition.



### **Grasmere Book Group**

April's book group discussed Helen Rebanks' memoir *The Farmer's Wife*, published in paperback this spring by Faber and Faber. Helen lives in Matterdale with farmer-author husband James and this is Helen's perspective on contemporary farm life, food and her family history. Whilst there was some skepticism in the group on another book reflecting on the Rebanks' everyday farm life, and potentially mundane details, many found it relatable, amusing and surprisingly honest about difficulties and challenges. Structured loosely around a day on the farm, and Helen's joy in food, there was praise for the clarity of the basic recipes which are woven into Helen's writing. With many thinking it could have been written as either a more conventional memoir or a cookbook, the combination of the two felt unique. Eleanor Crow's illustrations of the Rebanks' farmhouse and animals were also enjoyed.

May's meeting was on EM Ward's Forest Silver, a novel which has recently been republished by the British Library. Edith Marjorie Ward lived in Grasmere between the 1910s and 1950s. At the time of her death in March 1955 she had published many Lakeland-set novels, featuring book covers painted by William Heaton Cooper, and was wellknown in the village and beyond. She bequeathed her house, Crag Foot, to the Rector and churchwardens of the parish. First published in 1941, Forest Silver depicts village life unsettled by the arrival of evacuees during the Second World War. Will's ex-library copy from Cumberland shows it had lots of readers, particularly striking as the novel itself claims "nowt good comes ower t'Raise". From the opening scene where invalid Richard arrives in Rydal on a wet day in war time and casually causes traffic mayhem by walking in the road, to Bainriggs and Back o'Lake, the group could visualize where the action takes place (apt for a novelist whose first career was as an academic geographer). Blackouts remind us of the perils of the time, whilst Grasmere Island becomes a sanctuary for Richard. The eccentric cast of characters, including young landowner Corys de Bainrigg and briefly homeless Old John, the plot, and the comedy of the novel all resonated with the group with a rare note of approval for a book's ending too.

### The Farming Year - Shearing and Haymaking

We have been following Matthew and Emma at Brimmer Head Farm in Grasmere through the long winter months and into spring lambing. In June and July, now the better weather is upon us, there is a change of focus to shearing, sheep -dipping and making hay.

Fell sheep are clipped in July but sheep kept in the valley are dealt with in June. A professional shearer can shear a sheep in about fifty to sixty seconds, but amateurs would take up to a minute and a half! The sheep are also dipped to protect them against parasites such as mites, blowfly, ticks and lice. The wool used to be sold but the price of wool is just so low now that it is hardly worth the time an effort of most farmers to collect and package it up. One new market opening up is turning wool into compost and also it can be used as loft insulation.

At the same time of year, the grass is cut for hay of which there is only one crop per year, so it's precious to us. Between 200-250 bales of hay are needed to get us through the winter months but, of course, it depends on how long winter lasts and how harsh it is.

The timing of cutting has to be right as the hay has to be made 'when the sun shines!' It has to be as dry as possible. The bales are wrapped in black plastic which causes the grass to ferment a bit making it tasty, especially for the cows.

Like many farms in the Lake District, Brimmer Head is a family farm. Matthew and Emma run the farm alongside Matthew's parents, Robert and Jane, who, in turn, took over the farm from Philip and Anne, Robert's parents.

Farming has changed since they started at Brimmer Head. As with many jobs there is a lot more paper work! Robert and Matthew tend to do most of the day to day running of the farm, getting in extra help when needed, such as when gathering and clipping takes place. There is a wonderful link with the past as that the breeds of sheep have stayed the same. Brimmer Head farmhouse was built in 1693 and is Grade 1 listed. It is set in a wonderful location surrounded by pasture and with the fells as its backdrop. Living on a farm can look idyllic to the bystander but farms are usually cold and draughty. Living there has definitely improved in the winter now that central heating has been installed. The previous storage heaters having never kept the house warm.

As a family run farm lots of time is spent together and although days can be spent out at the agricultural shows, farming life never really stops, so holidays can rarely be taken all together. In other ways change is brought about by increased visitor numbers, not only because there are many more dogs, which if not controlled can worry sheep, but also increased traffic makes driving tractors around quite interesting in high season. What does the future hold? There is greater pressure to grow trees and we worry that the balance will tip too far towards tourism and not farming.

As always, we would appreciate any business support. There will be prizes for the best bearings and the best decorated pram.



### Fathers' Day, a time to celebrate male role models



In the UK, the third Sunday in June is Father's Day. It's a good time for sons and daughters to take their father to a restaurant, to watch a favourite sport, or simply just share some time together.

How do these special days ever get started, anyway?

Father's Day began because back in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, USA, named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother.

Mother's Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora Louise Smart Dodd knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. So the sermon on mothers gave Sonora Louise the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart.

Sonora Louise soon set about planning the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane in 1910. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off, and a 'Father's Day' was appointed. Sonora Louise had wanted Father's Day to be on the first Sunday in June (since that was her father's birthday), but the city council didn't have time to approve it until later in the month. And so on June 19<sup>th</sup>, 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane.

Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Father's Day flower. Some people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day - a permanent, national holiday.

### We're booking a summer holiday to Spain. What can we do to prepare and protect ourselves from things going wrong?

The first thing to do is check if your passport is in date. Renewing can take several weeks. This is especially important if you're flying to Europe as EU countries no longer accept passports that are more than ten years old, even if the expiry date is more than ten years from the issue date.

If your flight is delayed for a long time, your airline has to give you access to food and drink vouchers, phone calls and emails, and accommodation if you're delayed overnight. If your flight is cancelled, you have a legal right to a full refund or replacement flight to help you get to your destination. You have a right to claim compensation if your airline delays, loses or damages your checked-in luggage.

Compensation for other things, like a day trip being cancelled, or not being given the standard of room you paid for, depends on whether you booked a package holiday or arranged it independently, so you need to check the details.

Get travel insurance as soon as you book a holiday. You may already have an existing insurance policy. It can cover many of the things mentioned, but also events like medical emergencies. If you need advice, do check the Citizens Advice website, or contact South Lakes Citizens Advice.
