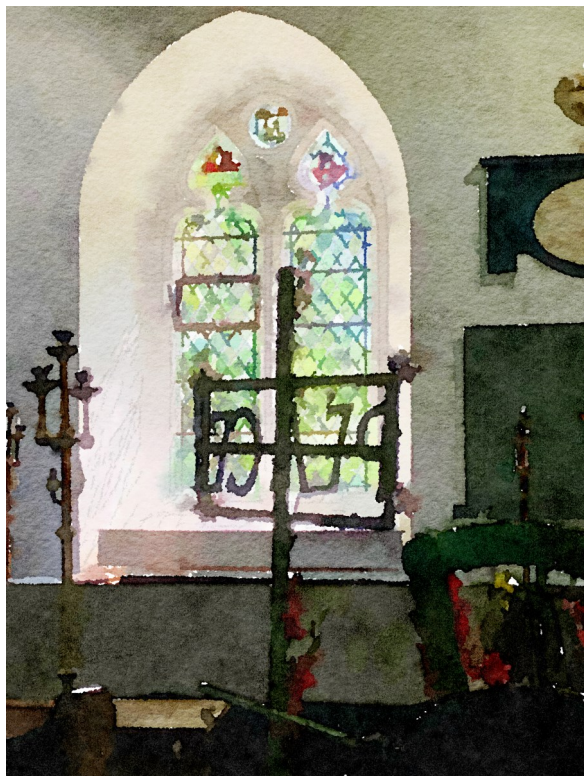

A Letter from The Vicarage

Psalm 121 - I lift up my eyes to the hills— from where will my help come?

Dear Friends,



On any given day in Grasmere, we are surrounded by what the psalmist once saw when he lifted his eyes to the hills—shadows shifting across Helm Crag, cloud gathering over Silver How, sunlight spilling like gold down Greenhead Gill. These aren't just backdrops to our lives. They are, in a real sense, companions—anchoring us in a landscape that feels older, wiser, and somehow closer to the eternal.

The Bible, too, is full of mountains. The team at The Bible Project recently explored how mountains in Scripture are not just geographical features, but deeply symbolic places—places where heaven and earth meet, where God speaks, and where people are changed. From Eden's high garden, to Sinai's thunder, to the quiet power of Jesus praying on a hillside, the mountains are where we meet God—and often, where God meets us.

That struck me recently whilst running above Alcock Tarn after rain. The climb was slower than I liked. The path unclear in places. But at the top, just as the clouds broke, everything opened up—and with it came a stillness that felt more than physical. In that moment I was reminded of a quote from the Bible Project, "mountains in Scripture are not escape routes—they are invitations to encounter God." And encounter, as we know, changes us.

But of course, no one lives on the mountaintop. The Bible reminds us that even Jesus came down after his transfiguration. The valleys—where people are hurting, hoping, healing—are where most of life happens. The mountain reveals, but the valley redeems.

So this summer, as walkers pass through and we share this landscape with many, I invite you to see our hills not only as beauty, but as signposts—reminders of the God who meets us in high and low places alike.

May the paths you walk this month—whether steep or level—bring you a fresh sense of God’s nearness.

And may we, as a community, become a place where others too can lift their eyes and find help—not just from the hills, but from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth. Peace, Lawrence

Grasmere and Cumbria Weather

MAY



The dry, warm conditions of March and April continued well into May. This resulted in the warmest and sunniest Spring on record, and also the sixth driest Spring here since 1929. What May will be remembered for here in Grasmere were the 22 mainly hot, virtually cloudless days from April 28th. until May 19th. which produced an absolute drought. The definition of an absolute drought is a period of at least 15 consecutive days, to none of which is credited 0.2 mm. or more of rain. This definition was introduced in 1887, 3 years before the rainfall records were established here. An Azores anticyclone was responsible for all the hot, dry weather. It was caused by a kink in the jet stream, which formed the shape of a Greek omega, keeping all the low pressure systems at bay.

Most areas enjoyed day after day of unbroken sunshine and temps. of 70.F. Sebergham recorded the warmest temperature of the month on the 12th. hitting 80.F. Thunder was recorded here on the 19th. with hail showers. From the 23rd. the weather finally began to change, with rain, cloudy skies and lower temperatures. Further weather fronts arrived from the west on the 26th. and 27th.. Of course, it was ironic that during the warmest and sunniest Spring on record, all three bank holidays were cool and unsettled. The month ended with a very wet spell of weather. Mean maximum temps. in May were well above average, with daytime anomalies approaching 3.C. Night temps. were close to normal and frost was widespread on certain nights. Reservoir stocks were significantly lower than the av. Thirlmere and Haweswater combined were at 49% storage at the beginning of June, well below the average. At Brampton, May 2025, will be remembered for an exceptionally long, dry spell which began in April and lasted until May 23rd., an impressive run of 31 consecutive dry days here in Cumbria, making a personal record since their rainfall readings began. JUNE

The glorious Spring weather became a distant memory. From the beginning cyclonic conditions were in control bringing “girt” heavy showers, very few sunny spells, and more general rain at times. Obviously, it has to make up the shortfall. With the dominant jet stream now in control, it also brought dust hundreds of miles away from Canada, due to out of control Canadian wild fires. Humidity increased on the 11th. bringing a hot, sultry day and the month’s first fine day. The humid conditions continued and on the early morning of the 13th. an electrical storm hit Grasmere, with a spectacular display with thunder and lightning and over two inches of rain deposited. As mentioned in previous reports, if you want to know how far away the thunder is, count the seconds between the thunder and lightning, each second represents 300 metres, with just over 1600 metres in a mile. Thunder was again recorded on the 14th. at 9.15 am. Towering cumulonimbus clouds unleashed hailstones from a great height, and 30,000 lightning strikes were recorded in the UK. Incidentally, the UK’s largest hailstone on record fell in the West Sussex town of Horsham on Sept.5th. 1958. It was the size of a tennis ball, and weighed 142 grams, over a third of a pound. Several hot, muggy days followed, with temperatures in the high seventies. Doing any physical work was strenuous, with the biting clegs not helping. On the eve of the Summer solstice, the heavens opened again, bringing further heavy rain. The last week of the month continued to be very unsettled, with dominant south westerlies, (“ the muck hole”) in full control. Grasmere has had its fourth wettest June since records began in 1890. The other three wettest years as follows. 1938 12.47 in. 1948 12.58 in. 2012 14.62 in.

Our big news of the Summer is that we have launched the Hall's new Audio Visual system with two community events. In June the film maker Terry Abraham gave a talk & showed excerpts from his film "Cumbrian Red: Saving Our Red Squirrels" on the new big screen.

Also, a "Wimbledon Pimm's & Strawberries" event was held with visitors dropping in throughout the afternoon to watch live tennis on the screen. As part of the event, local councillor Will Clark presented a £5,000 grant cheque from the Westmorland & Furness Locality Board, which has supported the installation of the new AV system. In addition, Cllr. Clark contributed £500 from his Member's Allowance, and the three Grasmere Parish Councillors — Sharon Savasi, Will Clark, and Andy Astle — generously donated £500 each from their Lakes Parish Council allowances toward the project.

Further funding was gratefully received from the Cumbria Community Foundation, The Hadfield Trust, Grasmere Village Society, and The Holroyd Foundation, all of whom contributed to making this vital upgrade possible. The village hall also raised £4,000 through community fundraising events, including the popular Grasmere Christmas Raffle,



which is generously supported each year by many local businesses in the village. An additional £3,000 was received in private donations from individuals in the community. We're incredibly grateful to everyone who has supported this project. The upgraded AV system will benefit our community for years to come - including the exciting launch in the Autumn of community cinema screenings in partnership with Cine North. Some more good news – we are installing a card machine in the Hall car park so users will be able to pay by card or by the RingGo app. Remember that 30 minutes' parking is free!

Looking ahead, the Lake Artists Society will be holding their annual Summer exhibition at the Hall from 2 August to 10 September. The weekly Wednesday morning coffee & chat sessions will recommence in September. We also have some further exciting events planned.

Saturday 20 September, 7.30 pm: Voulez Vous ABBA tribute band are returning for another fun evening of music and dance. Tickets £13.50, on sale at www.ticketsource.co.uk

Musical duo Fool's Gold will be appearing on **3 October**, Highlights Rural Touring Scheme are bringing a fused glass workshop on **23 October** and Steve Watts MBE will be giving a talk & slideshow on **24 October**.



The Hall will be closed for the month of November for internal redecoration. We apologise for the inconvenience this will cause to our regular hirers but we hope you'll understand and enjoy using the Hall all the more when the work is done. We are busy fundraising for our next project: repairing guttering, windows and part of the roof. We are, therefore, hugely grateful for all your support and donations in our efforts to keep the building in order and make it a place everyone enjoys using!

June's book group tackled Hwang Bo-Reum's *Welcome to the Hyunam-Dong Bookshop* (2024). A Korean novel, translated by Shanna Tan, about a small bookshop, in a quaint neighbourhood in Seoul, where Yeongju and her customers take refuge in the healing power of books (and maybe each other too). Some felt a connection with Toshikazu Kawaguchi's Japanese novel *Before the Coffee Gets Cold* as both books find the magical, uplifting benefits of independent retail. Another member discussed *Welcome to the Hyunam-Dong Bookshop* in sparkling terms as "lots of friendly chat and coffee and warm stories of families becoming closer and generations helping each other". The characters certainly come to the fore and grow, leaving many finding this a reassuring, escapist read.

A holiday feeling was in the air as a small but perfectly formed group gathered in July to discuss Anne Enright's Women's Prize shortlisted novel *The Wren The Wren* (2023). The novel depicts a mother and daughter's changing relationship, the death of an estranged poet grandfather, controlling romantic relationships and emotional damage. One of the group was surprised by the contemporary nature of the writing in the early stages, and there was a broad feeling that the opening was unrepresentative of the whole of the book which switched perspectives to tell differing generations' side of the story. The fictional poems included in the book resonated strongly as did the flashes of emotional insight in Enright's storytelling. All agreed it was well-written. The next two books scheduled for the group take us into the past on the trail of a mysterious artefact and then into the world of comic art. Upcoming meetings: AUGUST 14th – Alastair Reynolds, *Eversion* (2022) SEPTEMBER 11th – Graphic Novel TBC. To tie-in with the Lakes International Comic Art Festival (LICAF), which is held in Bowness-on-Windermere from Friday 26th – Sunday 28th September.

Autumn Antics: What Our Beautiful Red Squirrels Are Up To This Season

As the leaves begin to turn and the air takes on that familiar crispness, one of the UK's most charming woodland residents is busier than ever. Early autumn is a fascinating time for our beautiful red squirrels—and if you're lucky enough to spot one, you'll witness nature's hustle and bustle in full swing.



Gathering and Hiding: Right now, red squirrels are laser-focused on one thing: food. With winter approaching, they're hard at work collecting and storing supplies. You might see them darting through the trees or rustling among the leaf litter, gathering nuts, seeds, berries, and fungi. Their favourites? Hazelnuts, beech mast, conifer and pine seeds.

Staying Fit: They're also eating more to build up essential fat reserves. Unlike some of their woodland neighbours, red squirrels don't hibernate. Instead, they stay active all winter long.

A Delicate Balance: While it's a magical time for red squirrel watchers, it's also a crucial period for their survival. With habitat loss and competition from invasive grey squirrels continuing to threaten their numbers, every acorn cached and every young squirrel that finds safe ground is part of the bigger picture in red squirrel conservation.

So next time you're out on an autumn walk, keep an eye out and you might just spot one of these fiery-tailed treasures dashing past—hard at work, preparing for the season ahead.

Glenthorne

We continue our series on important organisations in the village that don't usually feature in the parish magazine. Last edition we interviewed Connie from the YHA, this time we cross Easedale Road to meet Terry Winterton at Glenthorne, the Quaker Guest House and conference centre.

Glenthorne, unmistakable in its white and green, welcomes hundreds of visitors every year, and not just Quakers, from all over the world. In 1964 Linton Taylor donated the large house to the Yorkshire and Westmorland Quaker meetings, who run the charity to offer "hospitality, respite and renewal".



The Quaker movement, known as the Religious society of Friends, was started in Cumbria by George Fox, believing "that of God can be found in everyone", spreading quickly, especially on the other side of the Atlantic. Quakerism has had, and continues to have, a significant impact, promoting the human values such as simplicity, truth, equality, and peace notably in education and industry (including Cadbury's, Barclays and Clarks Shoes).

You can visit Swarthmoor Hall near Ulverston and Kendal Quaker tapestry to discover more about the history of Quakers in this area, and Fox's Pulpit, where Fox held huge open air meetings can be found near Sedbergh.

Terry is the Friend in Residence (see contacts inside back cover) and is in Grasmere five days a week. He is very approachable and always happy to meet locals and have a chat.

There are 10 or so staff who run the centre, some living on site or in the village. Some have been at Glenthorne for many years.

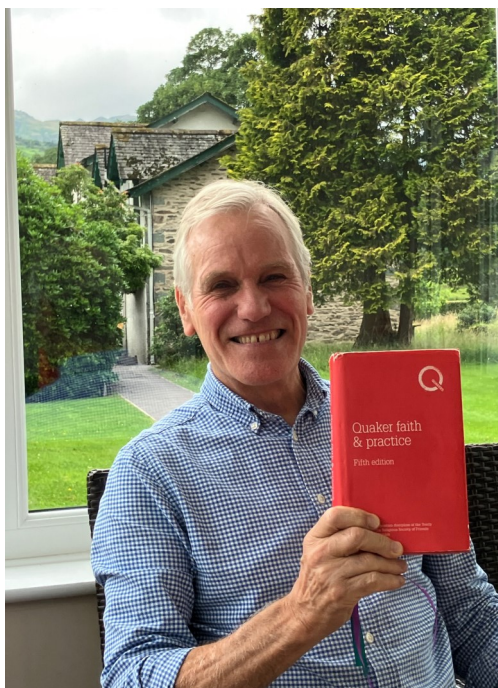
With 26 rooms the centre is another 'home from home' and the annex behind was once the stable block for Allan Bank.

Terry runs a meeting every morning for guests, which are usually held in silence. There are a wide range of courses on offer throughout the year – ranging from painting classes to dancing, literature and a wide range of religious and spiritual topics.

There is an open meeting at 11:30am on the fourth Tuesday of each month to which everyone is welcome.

Terry is particularly proud of the charity work the centre continues to provide with six Welcome Project weekends for asylum seekers and refugees every year supported by donations. Glenthorne also offer a series of bursaries.

Terry sees his role, something like a chaplain, as a "life not a job" – he says, "it is a huge privileged, the best job in the world for a Quaker!"

Bell Ringing

The bells at St Oswald's have been part of village life for centuries. The two oldest date from 1731 and even the youngest was ringing out before Queen Victoria was born.
